QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

The following responses to written questions were tabled by the government:

Question no. 361 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety: How many violent deaths occurred in Saskatchewan workplaces where the victim knew the assailant?

Answer:

Over the past 10 years, 2007 through 2016, the WCB accepted two claims resulting from violent deaths, which had occurred in Saskatchewan workplaces, where the victim knew the assailant.

Question no. 362 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety: What parts or sections of *The Saskatchewan Employment Act* are teachers who work in Saskatchewan schools (K-12) exempt from? Answer:

The Saskatchewan Employment Act applies to teachers except for:

Sections 2-15 and 2-16 of the Act

Subdivisions 2, 3, 6, and 7 of division 2 of part II of the Act

Part VI – Labour Relations

Question no. 365 (Ms. Beck):

To the Minister of Education: As of the 2016 re-licensing date, how many childcare centres in Saskatchewan were staffed entirely by early childhood educators at level 3?

Answer:

In 2016-17, three childcare centres in the province were staffed entirely by ECE IIIs.

Question no. 366 (Ms. Beck):

To the Minister of Education: As of the 2016 re-licensing date, how many childcare centres in Saskatchewan met the minimum staffing requirements for ECE levels 1, 2, and 3 staff members without any of those staff working under "exemption"?

Answer:

In 2016-17, 75 childcare centres met minimum staffing requirements without staff working under an exemption.

Question no. 367 (Ms. Beck):

To the Minister of Education: (1) How many ECE's in Saskatchewan were working in a childcare centre while under exemption in 2009? (2) 2010? (3) 2011? (4) 2012? (5) 2013? (6) 2014? (7) 2015? (8) 2016?

Note: Historical exemption information is not available for years prior to 2011/12. This data represents the number of exemptions issued in a fiscal year, not the number of individuals on exemptions (i.e. an employee may have more than one exemption in a given year).

Question no. 368 (Ms. Beck):

To the Minister of Education: In 2016, how many people employed in licensed, non-profit childcare centres received early childhood educator training while working in a centre?

Answer:

The Ministry of Education does not track the number of people employed in licensed, non-profit, childcare centres who received early childhood educator training while working in a centre.

Question no. 369 (Ms. Beck)

To the Minister of Education: (1) Of those people obtaining or upgrading their early childcare qualification while employed in a childcare centre, what levels of training were obtained – specifically, how many people went from no ECE level to ECE level 1? (2) How many people went from ECE level 1 to ECE level 2? (3) How many people went from ECE level 2 to ECE level 3?

Answer:

Provincially, the certification level of individuals employed in licensed childcare centres is not tracked by level for each fiscal year; transition of childcare centre employees to various levels is also not tracked.

Question no. 370 (Ms. Beck):

To the Minister of Education: In 2016, how much did the ministry reimburse for the tuition and materials for people working on ECE qualifications while working in childcare centres?

Answer:

In 2016-17, the Ministry of Education provided \$627,122.40 to licensed childcare facilities (centres and childcare homes) in tuition reimbursement grant funding. Data is not disaggregated for centres and homes.

QUESTIONS ORDERED FOR RETURN

To the Minister of Advanced Education: (1) The number of early childhood educators (ECE) graduated in 2016 from Saskatchewan's post-secondary institutions as ECE levels 1. (2) Levels 2. (3) Levels 3.

To the Minister of Advanced Education: Based on the most recent data available, the percentage of the students who enrolled in full-time early childhood educator programs in Saskatchewan that completed those programs.
