Question no. 10 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety, how many WCB claims of psychological injury have been accepted to date in 2017?

Answer:

From January 1 to October 27, 2017, there were 163 psychological injury claims accepted by the WCB. Please note this is for claims registered in 2017 only.

Question no. 11 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety, what has been the time loss due to WCB claim of psychological injury to date in 2017?

Answer:

From January 1 to October 27, 2017, there were 6,731 time loss days for psychological injury claims. Please note this is for claims registered in 2017 only.

Question no. 12 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety, what has been the average duration in days due to WCB claims of psychological injury to date in 2017?

Answer:

The average claim duration for the psychological injury claims accepted by the WCB from January 1 to October 27, 2017, is 41.3 time-loss days. Please note this is for claims registered in 2017 only.

Question no. 13 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety, how many WCB claims of psychological injury have been accepted that had no time loss to date in 2017?

Answer:

From January 1 to October 27, 2017, 39 psychological injury claims accepted by the WCB were notime-loss claims. Please note this is for claims registered in 2017 only.

Question no. 14 (Mr. Forbes):

To the Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety, how many WCB claims of psychological injury have been disallowed to date in 2017?

Answer:

From January 1 to October 27, 2017, there were 231 psychological injury claims denied. There are currently 43 claims awaiting a decision. Please note this is for claims registered in 2017 only.

Answer:

Yancoal Canada has been made aware of all incentives covered in the potash production tax regulations, like all current and potential potash producers.
