STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER Unparliamentary Language

The Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) requested that there be a review of the tapes.

I have reviewed what was said on the record and listened to the audio of the proceedings in question. I did not find, nor did I hear the comments alleged to have been said by the Deputy Leader of the Opposition. Accordingly, it is impossible for me to rule on this matter. For this reason I find the point of order unsubstantiated.
