To the Minister of Energy and Resources, for each year since 2012–13 wells used hydraulic fracturing, (a) for each year since 2012–13, what is the estimated amount of water used for hydraulic fracturing, and (b) for each year since 2012–13, how many incidents were reported as a result of hydraulic fracturing?

Question no. 59 (Ms. Rancourt):

To the Minister of Social Services, in terms of the Saskatchewan rental housing supplement, (a) how many cases were closed each month since December 1, 2017, (b) how many open cases were there in each month since December 1, 2017, and (c) how many clients accessed the program outside of Saskatoon, Regina, and Prince Albert in 2018–19 (average to date)?

Question no. 60 (Ms. Rancourt):

To the Minister of Social Services, for each Food Bank that received funding from the provincial government, how much was received in 2012–13, 2013–14, 2014–15, 2015–16, 2016–17, 2017–18, and 2018–19 (to date)?
