PRESENTING PETITIONS

To immediately fix the crisis in our classrooms.

(Addendum to sessional paper no. 25)

To develop and implement a suicide prevention strategy.

(Addendum to sessional paper no. 31)

SEVENTY-FIVE MINUTE DEBATE

The order of the day being called for the following motion for a seventy-five minute debate, it was moved by Ms. Chartier:

That this Assembly condemns the government for its failure to address the urgent problems in healthcare that are of its own creation, including:

- (a) The prevalence of hallway medicine,
- (b) The issuance of directives to healthcare staff discouraging them from speaking publicly about the growing problems in healthcare, and
- (c) The ballooning amount of infrastructure repairs needed in hospitals, clinics, and care facilities.

A debate arising and the period of seventy-five minutes having expired, pursuant to rule 25(5) the Deputy Speaker interrupted proceedings.

That this Assembly condemns federal NDP leader, Jagmeet Singh, and other federal leaders for their anti-pipeline positions.
