## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

**The following responses to written questions were tabled by the government:**

**Question no. 76 (Mr. Pedersen):**

To the Minister of Finance, what sources of revenue are included in the “miscellaneous” category of other own-source revenue in the 2019–20 schedule of revenue?

Answer:

This revenue category includes all other own-source revenues which are not classified by any other type. Examples include casual revenue (i.e. miscellaneous revenue, which is not recorded under any other category); refunds of prior-year expenditures and overpayments; gains on the disposal of capital assets; employee contributions to the public service superannuation plan; maintenance order repayments; and unrefunded bottle deposits (environmental deposits) collected under the beverage container collection and recycling program.

**Question no. 77 (Mr. Pedersen):**

To the Minister of Finance, what sources of revenue are included in the “fees” category of other own-source revenue in the 2019–20 schedule of revenue?

Answer:

Fees is a large category that encompasses several fees, licences, and permits (including drivers’ licences and motor vehicle fees), sales, and other miscellaneous charges across the general revenue fund (GRF) and other government service organizations (GSOs). Most GSOs earn a variety of miscellaneous revenues through fees and charges, the largest being fees for non-covered services at the Saskatchewan Health Authority, rental fees at the Saskatchewan Housing Corporation, tuition and education fees collected by boards of education, Saskatchewan Polytechnic, and regional colleges, and other regulatory fees and fees-for-service across several other GSOs.

**Question no. 78 (Mr. Pedersen):**

To the Minister of Finance, what are the sources of revenue included in the “other” category of taxation in the 2019–20 schedule of revenue?

Answer:

This revenue category includes all other own-source revenues which are not classified by any other type. These taxes include the corporation capital tax on financial institutions and Crown corporations, the liquor consumption tax, the insurance premiums taxes, the mineral rights tax, and the cannabis excise tax.

## QUESTIONS ORDERED FOR RETURN

To the Minister of Health, the percentage of admissions in addictions inpatient treatment where the individual identified crystal meth as the issue that brought them to addictions treatment centres in 2018/2019 and 2019/2020 to date.

**Return no. 56 (Ms. Chartier):**

To the Minister of Health, the percentage of admissions in addictions inpatient treatment where the individual identified opioids as the issue that brought them to addictions treatment centres in 2013/2014, 2014/2015, 2015/2016, 2016/2017, 2017/2018, 2018/2019, and 2019/2020 to date.

**Return no. 57 (Ms. Chartier):**

To the Minister of Health, the percentage of patients seen by physicians in emergency departments where the individual identified opioids as the issue that brought them there in 2013/2014, 2014/2015, 2015/2016, 2016/2017, 2017/2018, 2018/2019, and 2019/2020 to date.

**Return no. 58 (Ms. Chartier):**

To the Minister of Health, the percentage of patients seen by physicians in emergency departments where the individual identified crystal meth as the issue that brought them there in 2013/2014, 2014/2015, 2015/2016, 2016/2017, 2017/2018, 2018/2019, and 2019/2020 to date.

**Return no. 59 (Ms. Chartier):**

To the Minister of Health, for each month since January 2019, (a) the number of days the Dubé Centre at Royal University hospital was over census, (b) the maximum number of people who required admission but had no available bed to the Dubé Centre, and (c) the spaces that were used to accommodate patients who were admitted but had no bed in the Dubé Centre.

**Return no. 60 (Ms. Chartier):**

To the Minister of Health, the number of children and youth, in the mild and moderate categories, that are waiting for an initial outpatient mental health appointment as of October 31, 2019 in the former health regions of Sun Country, Five Hills, Cypress, Regina Qu'Appelle, Sunrise, Saskatoon, Prince Albert Parkland, and Prairie North.

**Return no. 61 (Ms. Mowat):**

To the Minister of Health, the number of midwives that are currently practicing in each centre.

**Return no. 62 (Ms. Mowat):**

To the Minister of Health, for each fiscal year since 2013–14, the amount the province spent on midwifery.

To the Minister of Health, in terms of the community health centre at market mall in Saskatoon, (a) the current referral process to obtain an appointment, (b) the information related to a patient's medical history that is shared with the health centre (i.e. physician visits, emergency room visits), (c) if there will be a MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) in the health centre, and if so, who will be operating it, and (d) for each month since it opened, the number of visits the health centre received.
