That the Assembly calls upon the government to take immediate action to provide cost-of-living relief to lower food costs for Saskatchewan people by:

- a) temporarily cutting the fuel tax on gasoline and diesel;
- b) banning unfair AI pricing by retailers;
- c) removing barriers that restrict competition between grocery store operators; and
- d) taking the PST off of food.

A debate arising and the period of seventy-five minutes having expired, pursuant to rule 25(5) the Speaker interrupted proceedings.
