QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1280, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Judges of the Provincial Court Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation?

Answer:

The Judges of the Provincial Court Superannuation Plan is not indexed to inflation for Judges who retired prior to April 1, 2003; however, the Government of Saskatchewan makes an annual decision regarding the amount of increases that will be provided to pensioners. For Judges who retired on or after April 1, 2003 the plan provides increases of 75% of the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) as long as the CPI increases by less than 5%. If the CPI increases by more than 5%, the plan provides increases of 75% of the increase in the CPI over 5%.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1281, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Navigata Communications Inc. Pension Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

Effective August 23, 2004, the Navigata Communications Inc. Pension Plan was curtailed and benefits are no longer accruing to the employees. Therefore, indexing to inflation does not apply.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1282, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Saskatchewan Power Corporation Supplementary Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation?

Answer:

No.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1283, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Liquor Board Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

No. The Liquor Board Superannuation Plan is not indexed to inflation; however, the Government of Saskatchewan makes an annual decision regarding the amount of increases that will be provided to pensioners.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1284, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Public Service Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

No. The Public Service Superannuation Plan is not indexed to inflation; however, the Government of Saskatchewan makes an annual decision regarding the amount of increases that will be provided to pensioners.

Ms. Draude asked the Government Question No. 1285, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford: To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: How much money has the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan, Eastern Region II based in Archerwill, received from the government and for what programming?

Answer:

In 2004-05, the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan, Eastern Region II, received \$133,291.99. The programming provided by the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan includes Parent Aide and Family Support. These programs provide coordination of support services to families identified by the department and include recruitment, on-going training, supervision and support of parent aides.

Ms. Draude asked the Government Question No. 1286, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Crofford:

To the Minister of Community Resources and Employment: How much money has the Mutual Equity, Trade and Investment Inc. received from the government and for what programming?

Answer:

In 2004-05, Mutual Equity, Trade and Investment Inc. received \$37,120.00. The programming provided by the Mutual Equity, Trade and Investment Inc. includes Life and Employable Skills Training and the Personal and Family Violence Outreach Program.

Ms. Eagles asked the Government Question No. 1287, which was answered by the Premier:

To the Premier: Is Executive Council and/or any department in the government of Saskatchewan purchasing tickets or receiving free tickets to the Centennial Gala celebration on May 19?

Answer:

The Chair of the Saskatchewan Centennial and Legislative Secretary, Glenn Hagel was an invited guest of the Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Hagel participated in the event by addressing the production staff and volunteers at the conclusion of the Gala.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1288, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Anti-TB League Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

No. The Anti-TB League Superannuation Plan is not indexed to inflation; however, the Government of Saskatchewan makes an annual decision regarding the amount of increases that will be provided to pensioners.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1289, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Workers' Compensation Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

The WCB superannuation plan was not indexed to inflation for fiscal year 2004 and previous years. Government of Saskatchewan indexing practices were followed by the WCB plan. Beginning 2005, the WCB superannuation plan is indexed to CPI up to a maximum of 2.5%.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1290, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Members of the Legislative Assembly Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation?

Answer:

No. The Members of the Legislative Assembly Superannuation Plan is not indexed to inflation; however, the Government of Saskatchewan makes an annual decision regarding the amount of increases that will be provided to pensioners.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1291, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the STC Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

No. The STC Superannuation Plan is not indexed to inflation; however, the Government of Saskatchewan makes an annual decision regarding the amount of increases that will be provided to pensioners.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1292, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the Power Corporation Superannuation Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

The PCSP is subject to ad hoc indexing, that is, as declared. The Lieutenant Governor in Council may declare increases up to the average of the increase in CPI between Regina and Saskatoon for the previous calendar year. Any declared increases become effective April 1st.

Mr. Dearborn asked the Government Question No. 1293, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Finance: Is the SaskTel Pension Plan indexed to inflation? Answer:

Yes.
