# **QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

### Ms. Bakken asked the Government Question No. 906, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister of Highways and Transportation: (1) Is Highway 35 south of Weyburn to the US border part of the 2005 spring construction project for the Department of Highways and Transportation? (2) When will the construction be started? (3) What section of Highway 35 will be included in the project?

(4) What type of work will the project include? (5) What is the cost of the project?

# Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 907, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Quennell:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Power Corporation: (1) What reasoning may be provided for rural customers paying a municipal fee? (2) How are municipal fees assessed? (3) What amount of revenue does SaskPower collect from municipal fees? (4) Do city customers pay this fee?

#### Answer:

- (1) SaskPower's rural customers, which are those that reside outside of the corporate limits of a city, town or village, will not be required to pay a municipal surcharge on their power bill. The authority to assess the municipal surcharge on a customer's monthly electrical billing is given through section 36 of *The Power Corporation Act*.
- (2) The council of a <u>town or village</u> can require that SaskPower collect an amount equal to five percent of the monthly account for electrical energy of every customer in the town or village. The council of <u>a city</u> can require that SaskPower collect an amount not to exceed ten percent of the monthly account for electrical energy of every customer in the city.
- (3) SaskPower does not retain any revenue from municipal surcharge. All money collected through the municipal surcharge is remitted to the appropriate urban municipality.
- (4) Yes SaskPower's urban customers, which are those that reside within the corporate limits of a city, town or village, may be required to pay a municipal surcharge on their power bill.
