QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 921, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Cline:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority: (1) How much did SLGA pay for veterinary services at Marquis Downs Race Track in Saskatoon in 2004, and to whom? (2) Please provide details of all veterinary services provided at Marquis Downs Race Track during 2004. Answer:

- (1) In 2004-05, Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority (SLGA) paid \$15,430 to Bar S.T. Ranch & Vet Services P.C. Inc. for veterinary services.
- (2) Track Veterinarian Duties at Marquis Downs:
 - a) To ensure that horses entered to race are fit and sound (physically able to perform). The Authority veterinarian shall inspect, on the day of the race, all horses entered to race at Marquis Downs that day. Should the Authority veterinarian, in his/her opinion, find any horse(s) that are not fit, sound, or ready to race on that day, he/she must recommend to the Stewards that said horse should be scratched.
 - b) Supervising the collection of all samples of saliva and blood for drug control purposes.
 - c) Attending all searches, when requested to do so, under the authority of the rules of racing.
 - d) Attending meetings, hearings, appeals when requested to do so by the Authority.
 - e) File an annual report with the Manager of the Horse Racing Branch at the end of each racing season.

The role of the Authority veterinarian is to protect the safety of the participants in live horse racing. This includes not only the horses but also the jockeys that ride the horses in each race.

The Authority veterinarian is also protecting the betting public. Horses that are not fit or ready to race have to be scratched so that the integrity of the sport is upheld for the wagering public that support the industry.

Should the Authority veterinarian, in his/her opinion, find any horse(s) that are not fit, sound, or ready to race on that day, he/she must recommend to the Stewards that said horse should be scratched.
 - b) Supervising the collection of all samples of saliva and blood for drug control purposes.
