Resolved, That towards making good the supply granted to Her Majesty, on account, of certain charges and expenses of the public service for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2006, the sum of one billion, ninety-nine million, one hundred forty-nine thousand dollars be granted out of the General Revenue Fund.

The said resolutions were reported, read twice and agreed to, and the Committee given leave to sit again.

Moved by the Hon. Mr. Van Mulligen, by leave of the Assembly: That Bill No. 117 – The Appropriation Act, 2005 (No. 1) – be introduced and read the first time.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Mr. Brkich asked the Government Question No. 1002, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Higgins:

To the Minister of Property Management: Can you provide details as to the criteria used in the tendering process for contracts concerning the service of SPMC vehicles?

Answer:

- Public tenders are issued for the supply and installation of windshields, tires and batteries. The suppliers must provide supply points throughout the province.
- In the Regina area vehicle and repair work is distributed by the Central Vehicle Agency (CVA). Vendors that are interested in doing wholesale repairs for CVA submit annual written quotes for a broad cross-section of common repairs. The repair work is distributed to vendors with the intent of spreading the opportunity among a number of businesses. To that end, the vendor with the lowest bid is granted the highest volume of work, and vice versa.
- Throughout the rest of the province the repair and maintenance work is spread among various centres. In these cases it is important that the vehicles can be serviced when needed without resulting in extensive travel to a specific repair shop. Businesses across the province that do a significant volume of repair work are approached regarding the possibility of a discount structure for their services. CVA maintenance staff will direct vehicle drivers to the shops with the lower rates where practicable.
- Competitive quotes are received on body and painting work not covered by SGI.
- All warranty work is performed by the franchised dealers representing the vehicle model involved.

Government departments and agencies and their employees are required to adhere to *The Tobacco Control Act* as are all businesses and public places. Our understanding is that all government departments and agencies comply with *The Tobacco Control Act*. Saskatchewan Property Management has advised the department that it does not provide designated smoking rooms in any space it is responsible for. *The Tobacco Control Act* also applies in government-owned property leased to third parties.
