QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Mr. Hart asked the Government the following Question No. 329, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Environment: What regulations are in place, if any, dealing with the transfer of fresh water, by means other than natural waterways, from Alberta to Saskatchewan?

Answer:

The Saskatchewan Watershed Authority Act, 2005, section 55(b), prohibits any license or approval to transfer water out of a watershed.

Mr. Hart asked the Government the following Question No. 330, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Environment: What regulations are in place, if any, dealing with the transfer of fresh water, by means other than natural waterways, from Saskatchewan to Alberta?

Answer:

Responsibility for this matter falls under the Province of Alberta's *Water Act*.

Mr. Hermanson asked the Government the following Question No. 331, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Power Corporation: Can the Minister assure the residents of the Rosetown area that the SaskPower office in Rosetown will continue to cooperate with SaskTel and SaskEnergy to provide one-stop customer service for customers of these three crowns in the fiscal year 2008?

Answer:

SaskPower has made the decision to remove the cashiering services from Rosetown at the end of March 2007. This service will be available for all three crowns via financial institutions in Rosetown.

Mr. Hermanson asked the Government the following Question No. 332, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Power Corporation: Can the Minister assure the residents of the Rosetown area that the SaskPower office in Rosetown will continue to cooperate with SaskTel and SaskEnergy to provide one-stop customer service for customers of these three crowns in the fiscal year 2007?

Answer:

Answer:

The policy requiring third party external reviews of proposed investments was implemented in 2004.

(1) As referenced on page 34 of CIC's 2005 Annual Report, there were six external third party reviews of proposed investments in 2005.

(2) Those investments were:

- expansion into Alberta by SGI;
- incremental investment in Coachman Insurance Company (Ontario) by SGI;
- investment in Navigata (B.C.) by SaskTel;
- investment in Hospitality Network (Canada) by SaskTel;
- DirectWest expansion in Western Canada by SaskTel; and
- incremental investment in Streamlogics (Ontario) by SaskTel.

Note that, although not an investment, CIC also reported in its 2005 Annual Report that an external third party review on the utility bundle was conducted in 2005.

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government the following Question No. 336, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Crown Investments Corporation: (1) To date, how many crown investments were subject to a third party external review? (2) Which investments were they?

Answer:

The policy requiring third party external reviews of proposed investments was implemented in 2004.

(1) There were two third party external reviews in 2004, six in 2005, and one so far in 2006, for a total of nine.

(2) Those investments were:

2004

- an incremental investment in Navigata Communications by SaskTel; and
- an investment related to SaskTel's establishment of a consulting company in the United Arab Emirates.

2005

- expansion into Alberta by SGI;
- incremental investment in Coachman Insurance Company (Ontario) by SGI;
- investment in Navigata (B.C.) by SaskTel;
- investment in Hospitality Network (Canada) by SaskTel;
- DirectWest expansion in Western Canada by SaskTel; and
- incremental investment in Streamlogics (Ontario) by SaskTel.

2006

- DirectWest expansion in Winnipeg by SaskTel.

Ms. Harpauer asked the Government the following Question No. 337, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Sonntag:

To the Minister Responsible for Crown Investments Corporation: (1) In 2004, how many crown investments were subject to a third party external review? (2) Which investments were they?

Answer:

The policy requiring third party external reviews of proposed investments was implemented in 2004.

(1) As referenced on page 21 of CIC's 2004 Annual Report, there were two external third party reviews of proposed investments in 2004.

(2) Those investments were:

- an incremental investment in Navigata Communications by SaskTel; and
- an investment related to SaskTel's establishment of a consulting company in the United Arab Emirates.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 338, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Environment: (1) Has the department instituted a plan for Mount Blackstrap to resume operations? (2) If so, could the Minister provide a copy of the plan?

Answer:

(1) Saskatchewan Environment is working on a solution.

(2) N/A.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 339, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Nilson:

To the Minister of Environment: When does the department expect Mount Blackstrap to resume operations?

Answer:

It is hoped that the ski hill will be open this winter.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 340, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Taylor:

To the Minister of Health: What is the amount of funding the province provides for a mental health resident in a personal care home?

Answer:

Personal care homes, while monitored and licensed by Saskatchewan Health, are privately owned and operated by individuals or corporations with no public funding.

Any person residing in a personal care home who is in financial need, including those with mental health issues, can make application for assistance through the Department of Community Resources' Saskatchewan Assistance Program. Applicants may be eligible for support ranging from \$615 per month to \$976 per month based on their care requirements.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 341, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Taylor:

To the Minister of Health: What is the amount of funding the province provides for a mental health resident in an approved mental health home?

Answer:

Mental health approved homes, while monitored by regional health authorities and certified by Saskatchewan Health, are privately owned and operated by individuals or corporations with no public funding.

Any person residing in a mental health approved home who is in financial need, can make application for assistance through the Department of Community Resources' Saskatchewan Assistance Program. Applicants may be eligible for support ranging from \$570 per month to \$1695 per month based on their care requirements.

Mr. Morgan asked the Government the following Question No. 342, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Taylor:

To the Minister of Health: Has the department ever received a recommendation from the Ombudsman to bring the payments made for mental health residents in a personal care home to an equal level with the payments made for mental health residents in an approved mental health home?

Answer:

Personal care homes, while monitored and licensed by Saskatchewan Health, are privately owned and operated by individuals or corporations with no public funding.

The Department of Community Resources through its Saskatchewan Assistance Program determines the level of care rates for residents of both personal care homes and mental health approved homes for those residents assessed by the Department of Community Resources as having a financial need.

In reviewing our records, it does not appear that the Ombudsman has made a recommendation to Saskatchewan Health concerning the level of care rates paid for residents with mental health needs who live in personal care homes.
