To the Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour: (1) The date that the ministry's First Nations and Métis Involvement and Inclusion Strategy will be made public. (2) The timeframe for the implementation of this strategy. (3) The First Nations and Métis groups that were consulted in the development of this strategy.

PRIVATE MEMBERS' MOTIONS

The Assembly resumed the adjourned debate on the proposed **Motion No. 3** moved by Mr. Lingenfelter:

That this Assembly calls upon the Government of Canada, the Canadian Security Intelligence Service and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to release the complete intelligence file on former Saskatchewan Premier Tommy Douglas, and further;

That in making this call, the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan asserts the following:

1. That public access to information is a core tenet of democracy;
2. That the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS) should be consistent in that it routinely releases intelligence files on individuals twenty years after their death;
3. That twenty-four years after Tommy Douglas' death, and several decades after the information on him was gathered, there is no legitimate security reason for keeping this information secret;
4. That the release of this information is important to the legacy of Tommy Douglas and to the people of Saskatchewan and Canada;
5. That this Assembly recognizes that Tommy Douglas served our province and our country with distinction, as the first social democratic leader in North America;
6. That this Assembly values Tommy Douglas' legacy to Saskatchewan and Canada, including medicare, old age pensions, family allowances, social programs, the Central Bank of Canada, civil liberties and rights legislation, and our Crown corporations;
7. That this Assembly recognizes the people of Canada voted Tommy Douglas as the Greatest Canadian to mark his accomplishments;
8. That this Assembly believes that Tommy Douglas' family, friends, and all Canadians deserve to know the information contained in the intelligence file.

The debate continuing, it was moved by Mr. Duncan, in amendment thereto:

That the motion be amended by deleting the words "legitimate" under clause 3 and replacing it with the word "known";

And that, the words "people of Canada" in clause 7 be deleted and be replaced by "viewers and listeners of CBC who voted in the contest."

The question being put on the amendment, it was agreed to.

\$210,000

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1611, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Norris:

To the Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour: (1) With regard to the Aboriginal Access Bursary, how many students have received the Aboriginal Access Bursary? (2) What was the average dollar value of each award? (3) What program will replace the Aboriginal Access Bursary after March 31, 2010?

Answer:

- (1) 1,423 bursaries were awarded.
- (2) \$2,490
- (3) The federal government replaced bursaries provided through the Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation, including the Aboriginal Access Bursary, with new Canada Student Grants for low and middle income students.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1612, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of First Nations and Métis Relations: (1) With regard to the Northern Development Fund (NDF), how many primary production loans were made in the 2009/10 fiscal year? (2) What was the average dollar value of each of the aforementioned loans? (3) How many regional development corporations have been created in conjunction with the Northern Development Fund? (4) Where are those development corporations located? (5) How many NDF grants were made in 2009/10 under the NDF grant program? (6) What was the average dollar value of each NDF grant?

Answer:

- (1) 27
- (2) \$7,591
- (3) Five Regional Development Corporations were created with funding support provided by the Northern Development Fund.
- (4) Regional Development Corporations were located in the following communities: La Ronge; Weyakwin; Pelican Narrows; Creighton; and Wollaston. The Regional Development Corporation program and all government funding ended on March 31, 2010, with the announcement of the Enterprise Regions.
- (5) 19
- (6) \$9,965

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1613, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of First Nations and Métis Relations: (1) With regard to the Saskatchewan First Nations and Métis Economic Development Program, how many different entities were funded? (2) What was the average dollar amount of each grant? (3) When the program is terminated on March 31, 2010, what programming will be introduced to replace the FNMEDP? (4) If new programming is introduced, how will it effectively encourage First Nations and Métis involvement in the Saskatchewan economy?

Answer:

- (1) The First Nations and Métis Economic Development Program supported 156 different entities.
- (2) The average grant amount was approximately \$23,000.
- (3) The Ministry First Nations and Métis Economic Development Program will not be replaced.
- (4) In an effort to support First Nations and Métis economic development, increased funding is being provided to the Clarence Campeau Development Fund (\$1.4M increase to a total of \$3.4 in 2010/11); a new First Nations economic development fund is being developed; and Northern Enterprise Regions have been introduced.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1614, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of First Nations and Métis Relations: (1) With regard to the Saskatchewan First Nations and Métis Community Initiative, how many initiatives and events were funded by the First Nations and Métis Community Initiative? (2) What was the average dollar amount of each grant?

Answer:

- (1) The Ministry, through the First Nations and Métis Community Initiative, supported 58 initiatives and events in the 2009/10 fiscal year.
- (2) The average grant provided was \$3,866.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1615, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: (1) With regard to the Remote Housing Program, what is the difference between a “forgivable loan” and a grant, for the purposes of this program? (2) How many housing units have been built as a result of this program? (3) What was the average dollar value of the loans? (4) What percentage of these loans was made to self-identifying First Nations or Métis homebuilders?

Answer:

- (1) A forgivable loan is a loan which is provided with conditions. If conditions are not fulfilled, the loan or a portion of the loan must be repaid. A grant is a one-time payment for an intended purpose with no obligation for repayment, or long-term obligation. Assistance under the Remote Housing Program is in the form of a forgivable loan.
- (2) 188 units.
- (3) \$47,550
- (4) The forgivable loans were not provided to the homebuilders but rather to the clients of the Remote Housing Program.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1616, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: (1) With regard to the First Nations and Métis foster home recruitment program referenced in the 2009/10 ministry plan, when will this program be implemented? (2) What is the goal for the number of new First Nations and Métis foster homes as a result of this program?

Answer:

- (1) Funding to the Saskatchewan Foster Families Association (SFFA), to assist in the recruitment of First Nations and Métis foster homes, started in January 2009.
- (2) The SFFA and Ministry are working together to develop the recruitment plan for 2010/11. As this is a new initiative, no targets have been established for the first year. A dedicated focus continues for attracting First Nations and Métis families to the foster care program.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1617, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: In the 2009/10 ministry plan, the Ministry of Social Services promised to “partner with the Central Urban Métis Federation Incorporated to develop new spaces for child welfare in Saskatoon”, how many new spaces for child welfare in Saskatoon have been created?

Answer:

The Ministry partners with Central Urban Métis Federation Incorporated (CUMFI) to provide the *Coming Home* program in Saskatoon, which is a mentoring service for women whose children would otherwise be in care of the Minister or where family reunification is part of the case plan. In March of 2009, CUMFI opened a 12 suite apartment building under this program. Nine of the suites are for women in the program and the remainder for live-in mentors. Each of the women in the program can have up to 3 children, for a total of 9 mothers and 24 children at any given time

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1618, which was answered by the Hon. Ms. Harpauer:

To the Minister of Social Services: (1) In the 2009/10 ministry plan, the Ministry of Social Services promised to “work with the First Nations organization to explore additional ways of delivery services”, what changes have been made to the cultural composition of social service delivery as a result of this promise? (2) What changes have been made to staff recruitment policies as a result of this promise? (3) What First Nations organizations did the Ministry of Social Services work with during the implementation of this promise?

Answer:

- (1) Engagement of First Nations in the development of culturally sensitive programs and services is part of the Ministry of Social Services long-term strategy for improving client outcomes. Officials of the Ministry meet with First Nations representatives on an ongoing basis. The Ministry is supporting an independent panel in the undertaking of an extensive engagement with First Nations communities as part of the child welfare review. Other initiatives undertaken to advance this strategy include: hosting of joint workshops with First Nation Child and Family Services Agencies; development of affordable housing through the First Nations Housing Trust and the Métis Housing Trust; participation in the Saskatchewan Learning Circle for Aboriginal Economic Development; and the introduction of Parent Resources for Information Development and Education for foster families.
- (2) The Ministry follows hiring practices established for the Public Service of Saskatchewan, including designation of positions for candidates of Aboriginal ancestry. In June 2009, the Ministry contributed financial and organizational assistance to the Workforce and Workplace: Strategies for Success Conference in order to attract Aboriginal candidates and to increase labour market participation of Aboriginal persons who might otherwise become dependent on government assistance.
- (3) The Ministry works with the Federation of Saskatchewan Indians, Tribal Councils, First Nation Bands, First Nation Child and Family Service Agencies, and First Nations housing corporations.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1619, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Norris:

To the Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour: (1) How many First Nations and Métis workers received training and skill development under the auspices of the Northern Career Quest Partnership in 2009/10? (2) What was the cost to the province for its contribution to this partnership?

Answer:

- (1) 401
- (2) The Ministry has committed \$6.3M to the four year Aboriginal Skills and Employment Partnership delivered by Northern Career Quest. Up to \$1M per year is provided for student training allowances and an additional \$2.3M is provided over four years for skills training.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1621, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Norris:

To the Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour: (1) Which employment initiatives of community-based organizations were funded by the \$5.9 million earmarked for “aboriginal workforce development” in 2009/10? (2) Which communities are these organizations based in? (3) How many jobs have been created as a result of these programs?

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1623, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of First Nations and Métis Relations: (1) Does the ministry (in conjunction with the federal government) continue to fund Northern Development Agreement applications on a case-by-case basis? (2) If so, how many applications were funded? (3) What was the average dollar value of each grant? (4) Will this ad hoc funding arrangement be continued in 2010/11?

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1624, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Norris:

To the Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour: In 2008/09, the ministry negotiated agreements between Northlands College and Peter Ballantyne Cree Nation, SIAST and Kawacatoose First Nation, and between Southeast Regional College and Cowessess First Nation. (1) How many students from the Peter Ballantyne Cree nation are enrolled in the Practical Nursing program? (2) What is the maximum capacity of that program? (3) How many students from the Kawacatoose First Nation are enrolled in the Practical Nursing program? (4) What is the maximum capacity of that program? (5) How many students from the Cowessess First Nation are enrolled in the Practical Nursing program? (6) What is the maximum capacity of that program?

Answer:

- (1) 14
- (2) The maximum capacity of the program was 15.
- (3) 13
- (4) The maximum capacity of the program is 18.
- (5) 2
- (6) The maximum capacity of the program is 14.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1625, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: Whereas the Public Health Agency of Canada reported in *Tuberculosis in Canada 2008* that tuberculosis rate among aboriginals in Saskatchewan is 43 times higher than among non-aboriginals, what actions is the Ministry of Health taking to curb the prevalence of tuberculosis among the aboriginal population in this province?

Answer:

Clinics are conducted by the Tuberculosis Specialist, Nurse Clinician and Clinic Assistant to reach clients throughout the province, including stationary clinics in Saskatoon, Regina, and Prince Albert and mobile (fly-in) clinics to northern communities.

Other initiatives include:

- Use of enhanced DOT (Directly Observed Therapy) and DOP (Directly Observed Prophylaxis) to ensure successful completion of medication therapy:
- Preschool screening for children age 2 and 5; school screening for grades 2, 4 and 6.
- Prophylaxis for Latent Tuberculosis Infection using DOP.
- In all new active disease cases, contact tracing is conducted. The contacts are followed up by the Tuberculosis Control team and are started on DOT or DOP treatment as appropriate.
- TB Control Saskatchewan, First Nations and Inuit Health, and the Northern Inter-Tribal Health Authority collaborate on a regular basis to meet the needs of the clients and communities.
- Tuberculosis Program Workers are from the same community as the clients which assist with developing support for the client for successful completion of treatment.

Mr. McCall asked the Government the following Question No. 1626, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. McMorris:

To the Minister of Health: Whereas tuberculosis rates are merely a symptom of the overall health gap between aboriginal and non-aboriginal residents of Saskatchewan, what steps has the government taken toward a healthier future for the First Nations and Métis people in Saskatchewan?

Answer:

The Ministry of Health is currently undertaking a number of initiatives aimed specifically at improving the gap between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal residents of Saskatchewan. Some examples are:

- The Memorandum of Understanding on First Nations Health and Well-Being entered into by the Ministry of Health, Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations (FSIN) and Health Canada in August of 2008. One of the purposes is to improve the health and well-being of First Nations people and eliminate the disparity in health status between First Nations and other Saskatchewan residents. The parties are working toward developing a health and wellness plan.
- The Ministry of Health is funding 15 projects in Saskatchewan utilizing the federal Aboriginal Health Transition Fund (AHTF) which is part of a broad, collaborative effort to close the gap in health status between Aboriginal people and the rest of society. Projects involve First Nations and First Nation organizations, Métis organizations, regional health authorities and the Ministry of Health.
- The Ministry of Health is a partner with the Métis Nation – Saskatchewan (MN-S) in a project funded under the AHTF and the objective is to create structures and processes to enable the MN-S and the Ministry of Health to better respond to the health care needs of the Métis population by adapting the current system.

The Ministry of Health is also undertaking a number of broader health initiatives and recognizes the importance of including First Nations and Métis people in these initiatives. For example:

- The Ministry of Health has identified the engagement of First Nations and Métis people as a priority in the development of both the tobacco strategy and its accompanying action plan. To achieve this there has been ongoing communications with representatives from the FSIN and MN-S to explore options for greater participation and collaboration. Also, a working group with representatives from First Nations and Métis organizations, Regina Qu'Appelle Health Region, Saskatchewan Coalition for Tobacco Reduction, Health Canada, and Ministry of Health has been established within the Saskatchewan Tobacco Strategy to build relationships that will ensure First Nations and Métis voices are integrated into the work across the Strategy.
- With respect to the Provincial HIV Strategy, broad stakeholder consultation commenced in May of 2009. In March 2010, an intensive HIV Strategy workshop with health and community leaders was held. The purpose of the workshop was to review the draft HIV strategy and refine the goals and objectives as required plus identify key partners to ensure its successful implementation. One of the underlying themes that emerged was the need for community engagement. The Ministry continues to meet with First Nations and Métis organizations and community based organizations to further refine/discuss strategies and initiatives.

In addition, the Ministry of Health is a member of the Jordan's Principle Joint Working Committee, which is tasked with implementing Jordan's Principle in Saskatchewan. The goal of this committee is to ensure that First Nations children have access to care and services similar to those available to other children who live in the same area. While this work is underway, a Joint Interim Agreement negotiated between the Government of Saskatchewan, the FSIN, Health Canada and Indian and Northern Affairs Canada was announced last September to ensure that First Nations children in the province continue to get the care they need, with no delays due to a dispute between the federal and provincial governments over who is responsible for payment of the services.
