STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

(Privilege – November 3, 2009)

Yesterday, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) gave notice of a question of privilege. The notice concerned responses by the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing (Mr. Huyghebaert) made during the oral question period of October 29, 2009. The notice and details of the subject matter were in writing and the proposed motion of remedy was received at least two hours prior to the regular opening of the Assembly, in accordance with the requirements of Rule 12.

The Opposition House Leader's case is that the Minister of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing breached the privileges of this Assembly by his responses during the oral question period.

To begin with, I want to outline for all Members the parliamentary issue that is raised by the Opposition House Leader's question of privilege. The allegation of the Member is that the Minister of Public Safety, Corrections and Policing was "attempting to mislead the House." An allegation of "attempting to mislead the House" is equal to a charge that a Member has willfully or deliberately misled the Assembly.

I think all Members are familiar with the Rule that prohibits the making of a personal charge or accusation against another Member in the normal course of debate. The charge that a Member has made deliberately misleading statements, if well-founded, is treated as contempt of parliament. Accusations and personal charges against a Member must be made directly by substantive motion or by raising a question of privilege.

I remind all honourable Members that it is not the role of the Speaker to decide if a breach of privilege or contempt has been committed. This is a question that only the Assembly can decide. It is the Speaker's role to decide whether a *prima facie* case has been established. What that means is the Speaker is to judge whether there is sufficient evidence to merit setting aside the regular business of the Assembly to debate the matter. If the Speaker finds a *prima face* case has been established, then the question is put to the Assembly in the form of the motion included as part of the Opposition House Leader's case.

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Tuesday, November 3, 2009

Yesterday, I deferred my ruling on the case in order to carefully review the evidence put forward by the Opposition House Leader, the authorities and relevant precedents. I am now prepared to rule on the case.

First of all, I want to outline the parliamentary practices of the Houses of Commons in Ottawa and Westminster, when allegations are made against a Member for deliberately making a false statement. I do this because both Ottawa and Westminster practice are cited in the case and because Saskatchewan's practice differs somewhat.

At Ottawa and Westminster, the primary threshold of proof that a Member deliberately misled the House is the Member's own admission of guilt. The Opposition House Leader cites a House of Commons case in Ottawa, which he states is "virtually identical" to his case against the Minister of Public Safety, Corrections and Policing. He quotes the Speaker, who cites House of Commons practice by quoting from Erskine May, as follows:

"The Commons may treat the making of a deliberately misleading statement as contempt. In 1963 the House resolved that in making a personal statement which contained words which he later admitted not to be true, a former Member had been guilty of a grave contempt."

The quoted passage can be found at page 132 of the *Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice*, 23rd edition, where the Profumo case is cited as the guiding precedent. In that case Profumo, a Minister of the Crown, confessed that he had misled the House and lied in testimony elsewhere. Similarly, although not mentioned by the Opposition House Leader, in the Ottawa case, the Minister of Defence admitted to the media that he had misled the House. This is why the Speaker quoted the 1963 Westminster case. In the case before us, there is no admission by the Minister of Public Safety, Corrections and Policing that he had deliberately misled this Assembly in Question Period on October 29. Therefore, the Ottawa situation is not "virtually identical" and does not support the Opposition House Leader's case.

In Saskatchewan, however, a contempt charge does not necessarily require an admission of guilt. Contempt has been found on the basis of evidence. On November 18, 1975, the Speaker ruled that unless evidence can be produced that demonstrates "knowing and deliberate deception of the Assembly, there is no question of privilege." Such was the case on July 13, 1982, when a *prima facie* case was established that a Minister had deliberately and willfully mislead the Assembly when a letter proved that he had been personally involved with the dismissal of an employee after having denied the fact in Question Period.

In the absence of a confession, the Speaker must review the details provided by the Opposition House Leader for evidence to determine if the Minister did commit a "knowing and deliberate deception of the Assembly."

I will first deal with the exchange in Question Period of October 29, which is where the Opposition House Leader begins his case.

The Opposition House Leader has quoted, in the first instance the Minister did say he had no knowledge that a dangerous sex offender is unlawfully at large. What isn't quoted is that the Minister then said "if the Member would like to pass some information over to me, I will definitely look into it." After another exchange about government policy, the Minister asks for "details on the specifics of the case." The Opposition House Leader then provided the specifics, which the Minister addressed. It is clear, and I don't think disputed, that the Minister did provide the information sought by the Member. What is under review is whether the Minister had, by this evidence, deliberately attempted to mislead the Assembly.

It is apparent that after further questions the Minister did know that the person in question was at large. The Opposition House Leader claims that if the initial answer had been allowed to stand, then quote "the Minister would have misled this Assembly without anyone being the wiser." The operative words are quote "would have misled." If the record had not been corrected, the Member might have a case if it could be proved the Minister did knowingly mislead the Assembly. The fact of the matter is that the Minister did not allow his initial answer to stand and he corrected the record after more information was supplied by the Member. For this reason I find that the Opposition House Leader has not provided proof that the Minister did knowingly and willfully attempt to mislead the Assembly. Nor has the Opposition House Leader provided evidence that the exchange in Question Period had in any way obstructed or impeded the Opposition House Leader or any other Member in the performance of their duties.

I will now deal with the claim that the Minister said one thing in the Assembly about his responsibility and another thing outside the Assembly to the media.

Generally, the Speaker is not concerned with what is said outside this chamber unless it has some bearing on, or connection to, the rights and privileges of the Assembly and its Members. In this case the Opposition House Leader alleges that what was said outside by the Minister to the media is evidence that he deliberately misled the Assembly.

In the Assembly the Minister stated "we decided and I decided not to make a public announcement." It is common, and required in this Assembly, for Ministers to take responsibility for the administrative and policy decisions of their ministries regardless of who actually committed an action. The Opposition House Leader has not provided any evidence that the Minister attempted to deceive or mislead the Assembly in this regard.

For these reasons, I find that Opposition House Leader has not produced the evidence necessary for the Speaker to find that a *prima facie* case of contempt has been established.

Mr. Yates asked the Government the following Question No. 152, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Krawetz:

Answer:

A number of types of property are exempted from property taxation by legislation in sections 292 and 293 of *The Municipalities Act*, section 262 of *The Cities Act*, and section 259.2 of *The Northern Municipalities Act*. In addition to properties exempted by legislation, municipalities may exempt any property which the council determines should be exempt from property taxation. This authority is given by section 295 of *The Municipalities Act*, section 263 of *The Cities Act*, and section 259.3 of *The Northern Municipalities Act*.

Mr. Yates asked the Government the following Question No. 154, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Krawetz:

To the Minister of Education: What is the difference between the number of educational assistants required under the provincial government's formula and the number employed by those school divisions who employ fewer educational assistants than required under provincial guidelines?

Answer:

No school division employs fewer educational assistants than recommended under the provincial government's recommended staffing ratios for student support services. Within the 2009/2010 *Funding Guide*, the provincial government recommends staffing ratios for student support services including the following professional and para-professional supports:

Mr. Yates asked the Government the following Question No. 155, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Krawetz:

To the Minister of Education: What types of property are communities currently allowed to exempt from paying the education portion of property tax?

Answer:

There have been no changes to the authority of municipalities to determine property tax exemptions further to the changes to education property tax introduced on March 19, 2009.

Mr. Yates asked the Government the following Question No. 156, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Krawetz:

To the Minister of Education: (1) How many school divisions received less provincial government funding for the 2009/10 school year than they had initially projected in their submissions to the Ministry of Education? (2) Which school divisions? (3) What was the amount of the shortfall in each instance?

- (1) The 2009/10 funding allocations provided to school divisions on budget day were based on school divisions' 2008/09 final budgets. Consultations between the ministry and each school division were then held in April and May 2009 to assess whether additional financial pressures existed. As a result of these consultations, 28 of the 29 provincial school divisions received funding increases over amount allocated on budget day. Funding to only one school division was reduced.
- (2) Saskatoon Public School Division.
- (3) \$3M due to an adjustment/correction in the school division's 2008/09 budget.

To the Minister of Education: (1) How many children were on the waiting list for child care spaces in Prince Albert as of September 30, 2009? (2) What is the total number of child care spaces available in that community? (3) What is the average length of time a child on that waiting list will have to wait before being placed in a space?

Answer:

- (1) The ministry provides funding support but does not operate licensed child care facilities, and does not have provincial or local data regarding the number of children waiting for child care spaces. The ministry does maintain a list of requests for new child care centre space development which can be considered an indicator of the demand for licensed child care in any given community. This ever-changing space development list currently consists of requests for just over 1,500 centre spaces. The ministry considers each of these requests, which are in varying stages of readiness to develop, in context of the available resources, other services in the community, capacity of the board and the availability of facilities.
- (2) The total number of licensed child care spaces in Prince Albert as of September 30, 2009, is 750. Funding for another 162 spaces in Prince Albert has been approved by the ministry; these spaces are currently being developed. An additional 203 space requests for Prince Albert are on the space development list for future consideration.
- (3) The ministry does not operate child care facilities, and does not have data regarding the length of time a child will wait before being placed in a space. This is particularly difficult to determine as many families place their child's name on waitlists for more than one child care service.

Mr. Yates asked the Government the following Question No. 158, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Krawetz:

To the Minister of Education: (1) How many children were on the waiting list for child care spaces in Saskatoon as of September 30, 2009? (2) What is the total number of child care spaces available in that community? (3) What is the average length of time a child on that waiting list will have to wait before being placed in a space?

Answer:

- (1) The ministry provides funding support but does not operate licensed child care facilities, and does not have provincial or local data regarding the number of children waiting for child care spaces. The ministry does maintain a list of requests for new child care centre space development which can be considered an indicator of the demand for licensed child care in any given community. This ever-changing space development list currently consists of requests for just over 1,500 centre spaces. The ministry considers each of these requests, which are in varying stages of readiness to develop, in context of the available resources, other services in the community, capacity of the board and the availability of facilities.

Funding for another 193 spaces in Saskatoon has been approved by the ministry; these spaces are currently being developed. - (3) The ministry does not operate child care facilities, and does not have data regarding the length of time a child will wait before being placed in a space. This is particularly difficult to determine as many families place their child's name on waitlists for more than one child care service.

Mr. Yates asked the Government the following Question No. 159, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Krawetz:

To the Minister of Education: (1) How many children were on the waiting list for child care spaces in Pangman as of September 30, 2009? (2) What is the total number of child care spaces available in that community? (3) What is the average length of time a child on that waiting list will have to wait before being placed in a space?

- (1) The ministry provides funding support but does not operate licensed child care facilities, and does not have provincial or local data regarding the number of children waiting for child care spaces. The ministry does maintain a list of requests for new child care centre space development which can be considered an indicator of the demand for licensed child care in any given community. This ever-changing space development list currently consists of requests for just over 1,500 centre spaces. The ministry considers each of these requests, which are in varying stages of readiness to develop, in context of the available resources, other services in the community, capacity of the board and the availability of facilities.
- (2) The total number of licensed child care spaces in Pangman as of September 30, 2009, is 0. Funding for a new 25 space centre in Pangman has been approved by the ministry; these spaces are currently being developed. No other space requests for Pangman are on the space development list.

In addition, 13.1M was provided in March 2008 to meet final funding obligations for three major capital projects approved in 2004. Écoles canadienne francaise, Saskatoon – 1.1M; Bethlehem High School, Saskatoon –7.3M; Tommy Douglas Collegiate, Saskatoon – 4.7M. When these projects are included, the total funding provided by this government is 303.4M during the past two years.

The Ministry does not currently track and record information in this manner, and without a case management system this creates additional challenges to maintain and consolidate this information.

Therefore, the numbers included are only those recorded from the use of hotels as these numbers have been consistently tracked and are purely used to respond to an "overflow" pressure.
