STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Appropriateness of Statement by Minister)

I am now prepared to rule on the point of order raised yesterday by the Opposition House Leader (Mr. Yates) with regards to the Ministerial Statement given by the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women (Ms. Draude).

First, I would like to remind Members of previous rulings relating to clarifying acceptable Ministerial Statements on March 24, 2010, March 17, 2009, April 23, 2008, April 15, 2008 and December 19, 2007.

Members will appreciate the difficulty faced by the Speaker in determining the appropriateness of a Ministerial Statement as it is being delivered. Often it is only once a statement is well under way or has been announced that the Speaker may be able to discern whether the statement is in order. The Speaker does not monitor government announcements and does not always know if a statement relates to something previously announced or the timing of announcements. Compounding my difficulty in making an immediate ruling is the need to ensure fairness to the opposition by affording an equal opportunity to respond to the statement.

In reviewing previous Speakers rulings and the information put forward by both House Leaders I wish to clarify for the guidance of members the acceptable guidelines for Ministerial Statements. Several rulings have outlined that Ministerial Statements should not comment on matters that have been previously announced, must refer to a new government direction, policy or program and must be made at the earliest opportunity. I find that the Ministerial Statement provided by the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women relating to Women Build a Habitat for Humanity program in Regina, contained information that was announced by the government earlier in the day. As outlined in my ruling on March 24, 2010 a new announcement is one that is made in the Assembly at the earliest opportunity. In this situation, the minister made a new announcement earlier in the same day. It is not unreasonable for the minister to make a new announcement in the morning and later the same day make a Ministerial Statement in the Assembly. Therefore, I find that the point of order was not well taken.

In the 2008/09 fiscal year there were a total of 5,626.03 FTE home care/special care aides in the RHAs including affiliates in the SAHO payroll system. The data shown in the table does not include home care/special care aides who are not part of the SAHO payroll system i.e. stand alone operators or those in private sector etc. SAHO is unable to provide information before 2005 because job mapping for joint job evaluation was not complete until the fall of 2004. The SAHO payroll system cannot confidently isolate home care/special care aides before this time.

Answer:

As of September 2010, there were 142.4 vacant FTE positions for licensed practical nurses (see table below). At this time the ministry cannot trend historical vacancies for LPNs going back to the year 2000. The ministry only began gathering data on LPN vacancies since March 2010 by including them in the RHA nurse vacancy surveys. The ministry began gathering more reliable data through RHA surveys for RN and RPN nursing vacancies since the signing of the SUN/Government Partnership Agreement. It is difficult to measure vacancies over a long period of time as positions become vacant and are then filled. Vacancies are best measured at a point in time which the ministry has begun to do. Additionally, the SAHO payroll system at this time cannot measure vacancies so the ministry relies on survey data such as the information below and postings on the HealthCareersInSask website, which does not include vacancies posted internally by RHAs.
