QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1010, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: With respect to the Blackstrap Provincial Park report, what recreation opportunities consistent with Blackstrap's natural setting did the report recommend?

Answer:

We are reviewing the consultant's report and recommendations will become public when the review is complete.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1011, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: What were the preliminary development options for Blackstrap Provincial Park presented to the participants in preparation for the park consultations?

Answer:

A series of five concepts for Blackstrap were created ranging from a low key, day use oriented redevelopment to the establishment of high end destination resort focused facilities. These were presented to stakeholder groups in March 2010.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1012, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: (1) When is the ministry expected to finish reviewing the Blackstrap Provincial Park report? (2) What is the timeline for the release of the report on Blackstrap Provincial Park?

Answer:

- (1) Review of the Blackstrap Provincial Park report will continue through 2011.
- (2) Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport is undertaking a review of the consultant's report and recommendations will become public when the review is complete.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1013, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: When is the phased re-development of Blackstrap Provincial Park expected to begin?

Answer:

Some projects are planned for this year as part of our overall parks capital plan. Any additional changes will be considered as part of the analysis of the consultant's report.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1014, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: How many businesses within the Saskatchewan provincial parks system have no-competition clauses for the provision of services and goods?

Answer:

There are 130 private business leases in the Saskatchewan provincial parks system. With few exceptions, commercial lease agreements have non-competition clauses.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1015, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: What is the rationale for the no-competition clauses for businesses within the provincial parks system?

Answer:

The non-competition clause has been included in most lease agreements since the early 1980s. The clause was created to help new businesses grow and become economically viable over time.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1016, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: What is the length of these no-competition clauses for business within the provincial parks system?

Answer:

The non-competition clause would be in place for the term of the commercial lease agreement.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1017, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: What are the criteria necessary to provide a no-competition clause to a business within the provincial parks system?

Answer:

The non-competition clause has been standard in all lease agreements since the early 1980s.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1018, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

To the Minister of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport: In what year did the province begin to offer no-competition clauses to businesses within the provincial parks system?

Answer:

Non-competition clauses have been included in lease agreements since the early 1980s.

Ms. Chartier asked the Government the following Question No. 1019, which was answered by the Hon. Mr. Hutchinson:

Answer:

Ministry capital projects in Pike Lake Provincial Park include:
