NOTICE OF WRITTEN QUESTIONS

The following questions were given notice on day no. 14 and are to be answered by day no. 19:

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 77:

To the Minister of the Economy: What is the total number of staff, for the whole province, who are dedicated to monitoring and enforcing the flaring, incineration and/or venting of associated gas by licensed oil wells and facilities pursuant to Directive S-10?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 78:

To the Minister of the Economy: What is the total number of inspections completed to enforce the flaring, incineration and/or venting of associated gas by licensed oil wells and facilities pursuant to Directive S-10?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 79:

To the Minister of the Economy: Who audits the results of an economic evaluation prepared by a licensee in the instance that a well or facility, subject to Directive S-10, is not conserving associated gas?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 80:

To the Minister of the Economy: Who audits the results of the economic evaluations on conservation measures prepared in the instance that oil well and battery sites, subject to Directive S-10, are flaring and venting associated gas in excess of 900m³/day?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 81:

To the Minister of the Economy: How many inspections has the Ministry of the Economy carried out to monitor operators of oil wells and battery sites to ensure they are meeting regulatory standards related to public safety and the environment?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 82:

To the Minister of the Economy: How many audits has the Ministry of the Economy carried out to monitor operators of oil wells and battery sites to ensure they are meeting regulatory standards related to public safety and the environment?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 83:

To the Minister of the Economy: How often does the Ministry of the Economy carry out productions volume monitoring for operators of oil wells and battery sites to ensure they are meeting regulatory standards related to public safety and the environment?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 84:

To the Minister of the Economy: Of the inspections, audits, production volume monitoring done to ensure that operators of oil wells and battery site are meeting regulatory standards associated with public safety and environmental protection, how many operators failed to meet the regulatory standards?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 85:

To the Minister of the Economy: Of the inspections, audits, production volume monitoring done to ensure that operators of oil wells and battery site are meeting regulatory standards associated with public safety and environmental protection, how many oil wells or battery sites failed to meet the regulatory standards?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 86:

To the Minister of the Economy: (1) How many oil well and facility operators reported gas vent problems in 2015? (2) 2016 (to date)?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 87:

To the Minister of the Economy: (1) How many random lease inspections were carried out to ensure compliance of oil wells and facilities venting gas volumes in 2015? (2) 2016 (to date)?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 88:

To the Minister of the Economy: (1) For the random lease inspections carried out to ensure compliance of oil wells and facilities venting gas volumes, how many problems were identified in 2015? (2) 2016 (to date)?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 89:

To the Minister of the Economy: Of the 22 times the Ministry of the Economy has requested licensees of oil well and battery sites to produce documentation describing flared and vented gas estimating and reporting procedures, or related operating logs, how many failed to demonstrate an adequate flare or vent gas reporting system?

Ms. Sproule, to ask the government the following Question No. 90:

To the Minister of the Economy: How many licensees of production facilities (or pipelines) are operating within three kilometers of each other that could consider clustering when evaluating associated gas conversion economics?
