MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the province of Saskatchewan, in session assembled, humbly thank Your Honour for the gracious speech which Your Honour has been pleased to address to us at the opening of the present session,

and the proposed amendment moved by Mr. Love, seconded by Ms. Sarauer:

That the motion be amended by adding:

And, That the Assembly does not support the agenda outlined in the Speech from the Throne because it neither recognizes the COVID-19 crisis in our province, nor proposes measures to address it, which is a direct result of the Sask. Party government's choices that put politics ahead of Saskatchewan people, and,

That the Assembly has lost confidence in the government.

The debate continuing on the motion and the amendment, the Speaker interrupted proceedings and adjourned the Assembly without question put, pursuant to rule 6(7).

Question no. 1 (Ms. Mowat):

To the Minister of Health, since July 11, 2021, (a) how many pediatric therapeutic personnel have been redeployed for pandemic-related purposes from Wascana Rehabilitation Centre, (b) how many pediatric therapeutic personnel have been redeployed for pandemic-related purposes from Kinsmen Children's Centre, and (c) how many pediatric therapeutic personnel, other than those at Wascana Rehabilitation Centre and Kinsmen Children's Centre, have been redeployed for pandemic-related purposes?

Question no. 2 (Ms. Mowat):

To the Minister of Health, since July 11, 2021, by type, how many cancer treatments and procedures have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations?

Question no. 3 (Ms. Mowat):

To the Minister of Health, since July 11, 2021, (a) how many total surgical procedures have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (b) how many elective surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (c) how many cardiac surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (d) how many general surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (e) how many neurosurgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (f) how many obstetrics and gynecological surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (g) how many ophthalmological surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (h) how many maxillofacial and dental surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (i) how many orthopedic surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (j) how many cardiac surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (k) how many otolaryngological surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (1) how many plastic surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, (m) how many vascular surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations, and (n) how many pediatric surgeries have been cancelled or postponed to date due to surge capacity limitations?
