To suspend planning for the Saskatoon freeway and update legislation in order to protect swales. (Addendum to sessional paper no. 27) To halt the sale of Crown lands and revise the Duty to Consult framework.

#### SEVENTY-FIVE MINUTE DEBATE

That the Assembly condemns the government for the lack of action to address affordability and the 32 new tax and fee hikes imposed on Saskatchewan people, who are struggling with increasing cost of living.

#### **PRIVATE MEMBERS' MOTIONS**

The Assembly resumed the adjourned debate on the proposed motion no. 1, moved by Mr. Domotor:

That this Assembly condemns the federal government's targeting of law-abiding firearm owners in recent regulatory changes and calls on the federal government to halt any proposed reduction of sentences for serious offences through the criminal code of Canada, as prescribed in Bill C-22 introduced to the House of Commons in 2021.

The debate continuing, it was on motion of Mr. Keisig adjourned.

### NOTICE OF WRITTEN QUESTIONS

#### The following questions were given notice on day no. 45 and are to be answered by day no. 50:

#### Question no. 29 (Ms. Young (Regina University)):

To the Minister of Health, between December 1, 2020 and March 31, 2022, (a) what steps were taken by the Government of Saskatchewan to track the movement and distribution of COVID-19 vaccines in the province, (b) what software, data management, and/or accounting mechanisms were used to track the distribution and movement of COVID-19 vaccines in the province, and (c) what audit and/or verification activity was undertaken to assure the appropriate and intended use of COVID-19 vaccines in the province?

#### Question no. 30 (Ms. Young (Regina University)):

To the Minister of Health, does the Government of Saskatchewan know of any real or potential instances of misplaced, misappropriated, or lost COVID-19 vaccine doses in the province?

#### Question no. 31 (Ms. Young (Regina University)):

To the Minister of Health, (a) have any investigations been launched by the Government of Saskatchewan, Saskatchewan Health Authority, or other provincial agency concerning instances of misplaced, misappropriated, or lost COVID-19 vaccines, and (b) if aforementioned investigations have been undertaken, what were the findings?
