That this Assembly supports the provincial government's made-in-Saskatchewan plan for affordable, reliable power generation to 2035 and beyond.

That all the words after "and further" be struck out and replaced with the following:

That this Assembly calls on the government to make significant investments in renewable power to ensure reliable, affordable, sustainable power and seize the economic opportunity that comes with green jobs.

# Return no. 132 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the recent historical annual electricity demand figures for 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, and 2022, according to customer category (potash, pipeline, northern mining, other power account, oilfield, commercial, residential, farm, reseller, SaskPower internal, losses) and expressed in GWh/yr.

# Return no. 133 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the forecasted annual electricity demand figures, itemized according to customer category (potash, pipeline, northern mining, other power account, oilfield, commercial, residential, farm, reseller, SaskPower internal, losses) and expressed in GWh/yr for each of the years 2023 to 2035 inclusive, and, for 2036 to 2050 inclusive.

# Return no. 134 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the historical and forecasted figures for power exports and imports in GWh/yr for the years 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023 to 2035 inclusive, and, for 2036 to 2050 inclusive.

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the historic and forecasted peak and minimum demand loads for the years 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023 to 2035 inclusive, and, for 2036 to 2050 inclusive – for peak winter demand, for maximum summer demand, and for minimum annual demand, expressed in MW, with each of these figures itemized according to the customer category (potash, pipeline, northern mining, other power account, oilfield, commercial, residential, farm, reseller, SaskPower internal, losses) and expressed in GWh/yr.

### Return no. 136 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the System Average Interruption Duration Index (SAIDI) figures for the SaskPower grid for 2012 to 2022 inclusive.

### Return no. 138 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the planned closure dates for each currently operating power station.

# Return no. 139 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskPower, the average net energy conversion efficiency for each of the following source categories: coal without CCS, coal with CCS, gas-fired cogeneration, gas-fired combined cycle, and gas turbine.

# Return no. 140 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister of Agriculture, in reference to the 4R's Program, the program sets a target that 25 per cent of Saskatchewan cropland will be under the 4R program by 2025, (a) whether the government is on track to meet that target, (b) the current status towards achieving the 25 per cent target, and (c) the government's strategy for ensuring that it will be able to meet that target.

# Return no. 141 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for Water Security Agency, (a) the Government's plans to fund Lake Diefenbaker irrigation project (the Project), (b) the cost projections associated with constructing the

Project, (c) who the Government has approached as funding partners and the status of those discussions, (d) the delays from the original timeline the Project has encountered in finalizing the Project plan, including any Provincial or Federal regulatory requirements, engagement with stakeholder and rights holders, engineering design and determining project costs and determining financing, (e) whether there are any costs associated with any of the delays, (f) what has been done to respond to the concerns expressed by citizens about the environmental impacts of this project, (g) what the Agency has done to consult with First Nations and Métis communities affected by the project, (h) the amount of money that has been spent so far on the Project, and (i) whether the Water Security Agency can explain how it justifies splitting the project into three phases and assessing project impacts in isolation, rather than as a single project.

# Return no. 142 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for Water Security Agency, (a) the reason why waterworks system assessment reports are no longer publicly available on the Sask H2O website, (b) the reason why citizens are required to file an FOI to receive a report, (c) how the Minister justifies withholding information that is in the public interest and that the public has a right to know, and (d) in the interests of transparency and public safety, whether the Minister will consider resolving this so that public citizens can easily access the reports.

### Return no. 143 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister Responsible for Water Security Agency, (a) the means by which the Ag Water Management Policy will consider the value of keeping water on the landscape rather than removing it, (b) how the WSA is engaging in good faith community engagement with the public in terms of receiving feedback for the development of this water mitigation policy, (c) the stakeholders that have been consulted so far, (d) how the WSA decides which stakeholders to invite to the consultation meetings, (e) whether the WSA intends to include a wetlands component within this policy or develop a standalone wetlands mitigation policy, as identified by the Provincial Auditor, and (f) when the Minister intends to comply with the Auditor's recommendation.

# Return no. 144 (Ms. Ritchie):

To the Minister of Government Relations, (a) for the past five years, the number of disputes that have been brought before the Saskatchewan Municipal Board for resolution, (b) of these, the number that have been resolved, (c) the number that are currently pending, (d) the median and mode timeframe for resolving issues brought forward, (e) the minimum and maximum duration, (f) the actions that the Minister is taking to reduce the both the frequency and the timeframes for these activities, (g) the process by which and the qualifications under which SMB members are selected, (h) how conflicts of interest by members are avoided, and (i) what assurance mechanisms the Ministry employs to ensure a fair, robust and timely dispute resolution process.

To the Minister of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety, (a) whether the Minister has any intention to address security concerns and rising amounts of violence occurring on Saskatchewan's municipal public transit systems, (b) why or why not, and (c) whether the Minister would consider engaging with municipalities to design and implement concrete actions that may help resolve these emerging issues.
