Return no. 1 (Ms. Mowat):

To the Minister of Health, (a) the total cost of the surgical initiative for knee and hip surgeries, and (b) the number of surgeries that were completed through the initiative, by type.

NOTICE OF WRITTEN QUESTIONS

The following question was given notice on day no. 28 and is to be answered by day no. 33:

Question no. 2 (Ms. Mowat):

To the Minister of Health, how many surgeries have been delayed due to a lack of beds in the ICU for 2021, 2022 and 2023?

The following questions were given notice on day no. 32 and are to be answered by day no. 37:

Question no. 3 (Ms. Sarauer):

To the Minister of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety, can the ministry answer the following questions about the placement of inmates at Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford who should be housed at Pine Grove Correctional Centre: (a) on which date did the ministry begin transferring inmates to Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford who were supposed to be housed at Pine Grove Correctional Centre; (b) from the date that this started until present, how many inmates have been transferred to Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford who are supposed to be housed at Pine Grove Correctional Centre; (c) how many inmates from Pine Grove Correctional Centre are there at present and what were the point-in-time numbers for each month going back eight months; (d) can the minister explain why inmates are being sent to Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford instead of Pine Grove Correctional, where they should be; (e) are inmates that have been transferred to Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford from Pine Grove Correctional Centre able to access support and programming; (f) what type of programming and support can they access; and (g) are inmates being transferred from any other facilities to Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford and, if so, from which facilities, and how many from each?

Question no. 4 (Ms. Mowat):

To the Minister of Health, what was the long-term care daily fee for Level 1 care by each year in 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023, and current?
