#### 2023–24 Supplementary Estimates No. 2

The committee considered the following supplementary estimates no. 2 for the executive branch of government and adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved, that there be granted to His Majesty for the twelve months ending March 31, 2024 the following sums:

#### **Executive Branch of Government**

For Corrections, Policing and Public Safety	\$8,968,000
For Government Relations	\$17,688,000
For Parks, Culture and Sport	\$1,824,000
For Justice and Attorney General	\$1,664,000
